Reason for Report: To provide a response to Questions without Notice from Council Meeting of 13 August 2007 and for Councillors to ask Questions without Notice in accordance with Council's Code of Meeting Practice.

Recommendation:

That the responses to previous Questions without Notice be noted.

Background:

The provision for Councillors to ask Questions Without Notice is contained in Section 3 of Council's Code of Meeting Practice which states:

- (1) *As a standard practice, "Questions Without Notice" shall be listed in all agendas of Ordinary Meetings of Council*
- (2) *Questions shall be in writing.*
- (3) *The Mayor shall direct the question to the General Manager or responsible Division Head; or if the question is directed to another Councillor, the Councillor concerned. There shall be no requirement to answer the question immediately.*
- (4) *If the answer to a question can be given immediately then such shall be done and a record made in the Minutes of the Meeting. If an answer can be given, but not immediately, then the Mayor shall indicate to whom the question is to be directed and the basis upon which the answer is to be provided (whether in writing and direct to the Enquirer, or by means of a report to an appropriate Committee, or otherwise.)*
- (5) *In the spirit of achieving the expeditious discharge of Council business the agenda item "Questions Without Notice" shall generally be limited to not more than 30 minutes duration unless the Council determines otherwise, on the evening in question and by way of specific resolution.*

Questions Without Notice should be asked in accordance with the Code of Meeting Practice.

Responses to Councillors Questions Without Notice on 13 August 2007 are as follows:

Councillor Comino asking:

Was Council invited to participate in the 'New Ideas' Planning Forum being held tomorrow? Considering this forum is publicised as an important opportunity to put forward comment on the Planning Minister's Planning Reform Agenda, are we being represented at this forum and if so, by whom?

Mayor in response:

I am attending in the morning as are Mr Coker and Mr Daintry.

Councillor Comino asking:

Was Council consulted at all by the Department of Planning in respect to the development of the "Heads of Consideration" for its exercise of powers under Section 118 Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979, prior to the recent gazettal?

Director Planning and Development in response:

To my knowledge, no.

Councillor Comino asking:

Was Council consulted by the Department of Planning during development of the Eastern Region Housing Strategy which requires Woollahra to have 2,900 new dwellings by 2031? If so how did the consultation take place?

Mayor in response:

The General Manager, myself and Mr Coker were invited to a meeting with a small group of Mayors. This was the extent of the consultation, from what I can determine. We were briefed by Heads of the Department and then the Minister came in and, we were actually proceeding relatively well when the Heads of the Department were there, however there was very limited consultation, if none at all. We were told what we were going to be required to do and were told 2,900 dwellings was what they wanted us to look for here. In addition to, I think about 400 or 500 jobs. We did not think with the intensification and the extra build form in Woollahra we would have too much difficulty finding the work, the jobs people but they gave us no suggestions as to how we were going to find space for 2,900 dwellings

Director Planning and Development further in response:

We will have a report on the metro strategy to the Urban Planning Committee which is to be held on the 10th September. That report will outline the consultation and will also put before the Committee a draft submission on the strategy.

Councillor Comino asking:

Has Council received any letter, circular or other communication regarding Minister Sartor's proposed changes announced at a Planning Seminar last week to Section 94 Contributions, how they are to be changed and what constitutes "Hard Infrastructure" in the Minister's mind?

Director Planning and Development In response:

No. I can inform Council that I attended a function that was addressed by the Minister at which he outlined a number of his proposed reforms but he did not address in detail the issue of Section 94, apart from a number of general comments in which he conferred that Section 94 contributions had grown to the extent that they were unsustainable. He certainly indicated that he would be looking at the operation of Section 94.

Councillor Petrie asking:

Will you write to the Managing Director of the Commonwealth Bank ("CBA") immediately and request that the Bank honours its undertaking to service the ATM machine in the Bellevue Hill Shopping Centre.

Could you remind him that when the CBA sold the Bank in Bellevue Hill in 1999, they guaranteed the community to install an ATM machine to be serviced at all times.

This ATM has been closed for the past 3 weeks citing security measures and is another detriment to the shopping centre.

Manager Governance in response:

The letter was forwarded on 16 August.

Councillor Petrie asking:

I am noticing fencing in Woollahra that has acute/sharp steel spikes on the top of fencing in private homes. It is clearly dangerous so can we stop it through the Development Application process and are there any liabilities for us on approving it?

Manager Development Control in response:

Woollahra's Local Government Area is characterised by many Colonial to Victoria era developments. These developments are typically characterised by the extensive use of cast iron palisade fencing, generally over sandstone plinths or low fences or retaining walls. Council's Paddington DCP, Woollahra HCA DCP and Watsons Bay HCA DCP all encourage the appropriate restoration and replacement, like for like of these types of fences in a heritage context. Some more contemporary developments have adopted palisade fencing, including contemporary versions of the various forms of spear top fences. There are no general prohibitions within any of our controls in relation to these forms of fencing. Woollahra Council has however maintained a very strong view, a very strong policy and enforcement position in relation to less desirable forms of security fencing. Council's Fencing Code, as repealed and replaced by equivalent provisions in each DCP generally seeks to prohibit barbed wire fencing and other dangerous forms of fencing such as broken glass fixed to the tops of masonry fences. Council has consistently and successfully enforced these controls and found support in judgements such as *Gray v Woollahra Municipal Council* [2004] NSWSC 112.

Councillor Petrie asking:

I am informed that the Paddington Bowling Club Enquiry, which according to the website has the status and powers of a Royal Commission, begins on September 5th. Are we or have we been asked to comment?

General Manager in response:

We drew to the attention of the Barrister which is conducting that investigation that we had some dealing with that property. We invited that person to inspect our files. We did not make any specific submission. The Barrister has done that and taken some notes from the file and he will do with those what he see fit, I would suggest.

Councillor Martin asking:

Have we received any response from City Rail re the formalisation of public access through White City? What is our action plan to expedite the approval in principle and design in practice for the north/south public path through White City to coincide with the conclusion of the Grammar construction process – the local community will be rightly angered if this doesn't happen.

Director Planning and Development in response:

On notice. However I can advise Council that we met with Sydney Grammar School, last week, and we commenced initial discussions with Sydney Grammar in relation to securing that right of way. I will answer that part of the question relating to City Rail when I respond on notice.

Councillor Excell asking:

It has been reported to me recently that many domestic animals along O'Sullivan Road are dying from cancer. There is some speculation amongst that community that it is being caused by chemicals being used on the Woollahra Golf Course. Could we please be told what chemicals are used on the golf course?

Manager Parks & Street Trees in response:

Council staff have not received any reports of animals dying from cancer in O'Sullivan Road. Woollahra Golf Club must comply with Council's Woollahra Pesticide Notification Plan, and all chemical use on the course must be appropriately signposted.

Golf Clubs are required to have "chemcert" trained staff applying chemicals. Chemcert training includes instruction on how to choose the least toxic chemical for each job and to apply the least amount of chemical.

Parks staff have requested the Golf Club to confirm that chemicals currently in use on the golf course are in accordance with the Plan.

Woollahra Golf Club have agreed to supply their chemical use information to Council staff. All chemicals used in open space must be registered for use by the Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority.

Below is a summary of this registration process from the APVMA website.

In most cases, before agricultural and veterinary chemical products can be sold, supplied, distributed or used in Australia, they must be registered by the APVMA in Canberra. The registration process is governed by Commonwealth legislation and undertaken according to accepted scientific principles and through rigorous independent analysis by several government agencies and the APVMA.

Each chemical product submitted to the APVMA for registration undergoes rigorous scientific assessment before it can be approved. In evaluating products the APVMA takes full account of the nature of the product, the scientific quality of the data and comments from consultation with manufacturers, Commonwealth advisory agencies, State and Territory departments and other stakeholders, including the public.

Councillor Dawson asking:

What has happened to the bus stop on New South Head Road opposite New Beach Road? It has disappeared. Why?

Manager Property & Projects in response:

The bus shelter at this location was extensively damaged by a vehicle and had to be demolished for safety reasons. As advised by the Director at the meeting, the footings were poured last week and I can further advise that the structure assembly has commenced on site this week and should be complete by Friday.

Councillor Shapiro asking:

Can you please thank the Traffic Committee for their work on the roadworks and 40kmh speed zone at the Bellevue Hill Shops? The new scheme is working really well and I am particularly pleased that with the addition of extra parking spaces resulting from last week's Traffic Committee that there is no overall loss of parking.

Director Technical Services in response:

I will

Councillor Boskovitz asking:

I have received a number of complaints about a few shared bike and pedestrian zones on footpaths on Victoria Road and especially on the corner of Old South Head Road and Victoria Road, Bellevue Hill. Bike lanes are one thing but footpaths being used as share zones are especially dangerous. On the east side of Victoria Road the footpath in some areas are barely 1m wide which makes this situation extremely dangerous. On the corner of Victoria and Old South Head Roads there is a steep and sharp corner which leads to these shared zones being very dangerous.

Where and when were these shared bike and pedestrian zones approved by this Council?

Manager Public Infrastructure in response:

Victoria Road/Old South Head Road is on Route 4. Route 4 includes Victoria Road and Old South Head Road (west of the intersection). This was approved by Council at the Community & Environment Committee meeting held on 10 April 2006.

The footpath on the northern side of Old South Head Road east of Victoria Road is not a bike route. This matter has been listed on the agenda of the next Bicycle Working Party which will be held on 23 August 2007.

Councillor Boskovitz asking:

Recently traffic calming measures were conducted on Hopetoun Avenue Vaucluse. While many are appropriate and good, one is of particular concern to many residents.

There is a sweeping left hand turn just past Serpentine Parade which adjusted the lanes quite substantially and has resulted in a number of very close calls between oncoming vehicles.

I would ask that you check this particular corner and ensure that it was redone in accordance with the plans.

Manager Public Infrastructure in response:

No complaints or reports of close calls have been received at Council. Speed of vehicles has reduced markedly as is planned with these works.
