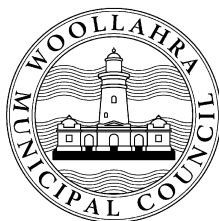

- a) notes its opposition to the Liquor Amendment Act 2014 and concerns that the stated aim of reducing alcohol related violence will not be achieved by this Act;
- b) recognises the negative impacts this Act will have on the Woollahra LGA due to geographic proximity to the newly created CBD exclusion zone and the real potential for the displacement of alcohol-fuelled violence into neighbouring Woollahra;
- c) notes its opposition to the further mandatory sentencing provisions for assault occasioning bodily harm, reckless grievous bodily harm, reckless wounding, assault against police officers and sexual assault;
- d) calls on the NSW government to repeal the Liquor Amendment Bill 2014 and enact alternative measures as soon as practicable;
- e) requests the Mayor to write to the Premier, relevant Ministers, and relevant representatives of the Opposition, the Greens, Christian Democrats and Shooters & Fishers parties advising them of Council's concerns and the substance of this motion; and
- f) requests staff to prepare a report detailing a baseline study of complaints and alcohol-related violence in the municipality now, and comparing this data to that gathered for the first six months of the operation of the Liquor Amendment Act.

Background

A number of Australian jurisdictions have trialled or introduced permanent restrictions on the hours of licensed operation or lockouts, similar to what has been enacted through the Liquor Amendment Act 2014. The results of these schemes are at best, mixed. Much is made of the Newcastle experience, where assaults seem to have been reduced by 37 percent. Even accepting that the measures in Newcastle were successful, the relevance of this experience to the expanded Sydney CBD is at best tenuous. A Queensland University of Technology study, for example, found that the application of lockouts on the Gold Coast had a similar performance to Newcastle. However the results of the same restrictions in in Fortitude Valley, which is analogous to Kings Cross, showed little improvement in violence and, by some measures, made matters much worse.

Furthermore, an investigation reported in the Newcastle Herald found that although lockouts and last drinks are said to have contributed to the decrease in assaults in Newcastle, similar levels of reductions in alcohol-related violence were also found in areas such as Penrith, Wollongong and Sutherland Shire. None of these areas had lockouts or last drinks but still managed similar or greater reductions in assaults as Newcastle. Similarly, a trial in Melbourne produced results that contained both increases and decreases in different types of violence. The only certainty here is that the evidence base for the effectiveness of lockouts and last drinks in reducing alcohol-related violence is far from conclusively established.

Even if the data suggests that lockouts and last drinks work, the application to the expanded CBD is very likely to see a 3 am exodus of patrons across the borders and into late night venues in the surrounding local government areas, like Woollahra. Far from reducing street violence, the movement of a large number of people into new venues is likely to increase the incidence of violence in the new exclusion zone and in the surrounding suburbs of Paddington, Double Bay and Bondi Junction. Alternatively, pubs located in the Woollahra municipality and well outside the exclusion zone are likely to attract drinkers who don't want to endure the 1:30am lockout; increasing the potentiality for alcohol-fuelled violence in our local government area.

The O'Farrell government's response to the rising concerns around the prevalence of alcohol-fuelled violence in our society relies on a suite of measures not yet evidence based. Worse still, the introduction of mandatory sentencing provisions will remove judicial discretion, guaranteeing unjust outcomes and an increase in NSW's incarceration rate. Mandatory minimum sentences have been disproven to work as an effective deterrent in criminology studies in Australia and the US. Despite this, the constitutional dubiousness of such laws which breach of the separation of powers, the NSW government is pressing ahead with further mandatory minimums in addition to the "one-punch" provision already legislated. Thousands of cases of more minor offences such as assault occasioning actual bodily harm and assaulting police will also be subject to unfair mandatory minimum sentences.

The O'Farrell government's response to the issue of alcohol-fuelled violence is narrow. Alternative measures including the strict enforcement of RSA, increasing penalties for licensees not just staff for breaches of RSA, sensible restrictions on alcohol advertising and outlet density, increasing public transport services, increasing local community involvement in alcohol management decisions, and making membership of local liquor accords compulsory, have not been considered in the government's policy response.

Councillor Bennett asking:

Vaucluse House's licence is held by Historic House Trust who manage the property, which only allows for twelve events a year to be held. From the correspondence I received, there are 10 fold events organised in Vaucluse House causing noise, nuisance and aggravation to the neighbourhood. According to the licence they have to notify the Liquor Licencing Board, Rose Bay Police as well as Council, 14 days prior to the event.

My question is, did notification come to the Council because apparently no notification came to the Liquor Licencing Board or Rose Bay Police? If not what are we going to do about it?

Director of Planning & Development in response:

On Notice. It is not the Council's responsibly to implement or to enforce any conditions of a licence under the Liquor Act, that is the responsibly of the Office of Liquor, Gaming and Racing. However, if we are aware there being a breach of the licence Council can certainly bring that to the attention of the Office. We do have a responsibly to enforce the relevant conditions of development consent. In this case the consent goes back many years and it is not subject to the usual conditions that we now place on development consents for example relating to trading hours, noise and general amenity, but having made those comments I will take that question on notice and come back to you with a more in-depth reply.

Councillor Zeltzer further asking:

When you are investigating the conditions of consent, could you please check whether we limited the number of occasions that Vaucluse House can be used as a function centre?

Director of Planning & Development in response:

I will respond to that particular question in my response.

Councillor Petrie asking:

Many months ago, I put a Notice of Motion regarding the possible heritage listing of Altona, when can I expect to see the report?

Director of Planning & Development in response:

This has now been transferred into our Delivery Program & Operational Plan (DPOP). We have had delays in responding to that Notice of Motion due to the resignation of our former Strategic Heritage Officer. I will come back formally with a written response so I can give you a more precise indication on when the report on Altona shall be delivered.
