Background:

The Independent Local Government Review Panel has released its "Future Directions for NSW Local Government – Twenty Essential Steps" paper and is inviting submissions in response to the paper until 28 June 2013. The paper presents detailed discussion on what the Panel see as twenty essential steps towards a new sustainable model for Local Government in NSW.

Woollahra Council is preparing a comprehensive submission in response to the Panel's latest paper. This submission will address each of the proposed twenty steps - many of which I believe have considerable merit for reshaping and strengthening the future of local government in NSW but do not require amalgamations to achieve. I will present Council's submission in a future Mayoral Minute.

At this point however, I have to say that as Mayor I cannot support the Panel's proposal for the amalgamation of Woollahra Council with the City of Sydney, Waverley, Randwick and Botany Bay Councils, and potentially the Councils of Leichhardt and Marrickville, as the Panel proposes in Step 15 – Reshape Metropolitan Governance. A 'global city' of this size, as the Panel refers to with a population of between 600,000 to 800,000 people, clearly does not keep the 'local' in Local Government for the residents of Woollahra or the other affected council areas.

As I have stated publicly, this Council cannot support the 'global city' idea because we haven't seen or heard any benefits for our local residents that would not be otherwise achieved through minor sensible reform and continuous improvement. The Panel's paper does not in any way justify the massive upheaval and disruption the implementation of the super-council idea would cause for local residents nor does it present evidence of any benefits to our communities. It is simply an idea, a philosophical position of the Panel than is not supported by evidence of any benefits to the community.

Similarly, there is no evidence that the size of a council determines efficiency or sustainability.

The purpose of this report is to inform the community that we are doing whatever is necessary to protect their interests and to present to the Council what I see as the structure of Council's submission in response to the Panel's Future Directions Paper.

I have also provided copies of Council's previous submissions to the Local Government Review Panel as Annexure to this Minute.

Discussion:

Council's submission should provide comment in response to each of the following twenty steps outlined in the Panel's paper:

- 1. Face the challenges of change
- 2. Create a Sustainable System
- 3. Keep the 'Local' in Local Government
- 4. Confront Financial Realities
- 5. Ensure Fiscal Responsibility
- 6. Bolster the Revenue Base
- 7. Tackle the Infrastructure Backlog
- 8. Promote Innovation, Productivity and Competitiveness
- 9. Advance Improvement and Accountability
- 10. Improve Political Leadership
- 11. Enhance the Status of Mayors
- 12. Revisit Council-Management Relations
- 13. Build Strong Regions
- 14. Reconfigure Rural Councils
- 15. Reshape Metropolitan Governance
- 16. Strengthen the Hunter, Central Coast and Illawarra
- 17. Establish a 'Western Region Authority'
- 18. Progress the State-Local Agreement
- 19. Refocus Local Government NSW
- 20. Drive and Monitor Ongoing Reform

As I previously mentioned, many of these steps, such as ensuring fiscal responsibility, bolstering the revenue base and tackling the infrastructure backlog have considerable merit and are essential elements of a sustainable system of local government in NSW.

Similarly, the concept of establishing a metropolitan Council of Mayors to provide a 'voice' for Sydney and to represent local government and local communities in high-level consultation with State and Federal Governments has merit and warrants further detailed analysis. SSROC has already endorsed this concept in its own submission to the Panel.

Our submission will strongly argue however that the massive upheaval that would result from the widespread amalgamation of councils proposed by the Panel, particularly in the Sydney metropolitan area, is unnecessary to achieve what I see as the desired outcome of reform – being the long term sustainability of councils in a high functioning system of local government.

Is reform necessary? Clearly the answer to this is 'yes' as there are many councils struggling to meet the challenges and demands of modern day local government – but many more are not. This has been Woollahra's argument in our two previous submissions to the Panel which have highlighted the many elements of good local government that are working well, not only here at Woollahra, but no doubt similarly well at many councils in NSW.

High functioning councils such as ours need to be encouraged to continue their good work and supported by sensible strategies for reform that enable them to continue to develop and improve performance. Ensuring fiscal responsibility, bolstering the revenue base and tackling the infrastructure backlog are essential first steps in this challenge.

Our submission will argue that the State Government's focus for reform of local government should be directed towards specific intervention strategies for those council areas that are clearly struggling to meet the demands and expectations of local communities. Each of these communities have targeted priorities and different financial capacities to deliver on those priorities. The financial capacity of our community is not in question. We can deliver.

Amalgamations and new models such as the proposed Western Region Authority may well be the answer to problems in specific areas of the State but there is clearly no business case that supports the Panel's view that widespread amalgamation is the only solution to improving the 'system' that is local government.

Other matters that our submission should address include:

> Challenge the Panel's Global City concept

The Panel makes it clear that they see the amalgamation of 5 or 7 metropolitan councils (including Woollahra) as a means of exploring the concept of a "truly 'global city" for Sydney. However, it needs to be highlighted that international literature identifies the characteristics of a true global city – including; business activity; human capital; information exchange; cultural experience; and political engagement.

Some of the general characteristics referred to when talking about global cities include:

- Home to major stock exchanges and indexes
- Influential in international political affairs
- Home to world-renowned cultural institutions
- Service a major media hub
- Large mass transit networks
- Home to a large international airport
- Having a prominent skyline

These characteristic do not include geographical boundaries.

Sydney, in its entirety, is already internationally recognised in the top 10 global cities of the world based on these generally accepted characteristics. Local Government boundaries in the eastern suburbs of Sydney are clearly not a determining factor for Sydney's recognition as a 'truly global city' – Sydney already is a truly global city.

Similarly, the provision of local services to local communities is not a characteristic of a global city. The provision of local services to local communities is the role of local government. This is what keeps the 'local' in local government.

Reform of Local Government v New Local Government

Our submission will argue that what is proposed through widespread amalgamation of local government in NSW but rather, a drastic attempt to create a higher functioning system of local government in the absence of specific evidence to demonstrate that it will work. Questions we will ask the Panel in our submission about this 'new' model for local government include:

- What are the benefits to local communities of this new Local Government?
- What will be the establishment costs?
- Where is the risk analysis?
- Where is the evidence that it will deliver any tangible benefits?
- Where is the evidence that the benefits will exceed the costs?
- How will the amalgamations be funded more debt, more deficits, more rates?

A properly constructed business case would have answered these questions but the Panel has failed to produce any of these answers.

There are significant risks associated with any major project or reform program and a business case is essential to mitigate associated risks.

The Panel references reform of local government in Auckland as a model – yet a report from the Office of the Auditor-General in New Zealand states that more than \$100 million has been invested in setting up the new Auckland Council's financial, procurement and payroll systems and the associated monitoring and management alone. Using this as a guide across what the Panel proposes for the greater Sydney area could cost Sydney ratepayers hundreds of millions of dollars – and for what benefit? Is it to accomplish 'strategic capacity' or is it to create a structure delivering 'local' benefits to communities funded by local communities?

The hundreds of millions of dollars spent on amalgamations would go a long towards fixing the infrastructure backlog for local communities.

The Strategic Capacity Argument

The Panel has stated publicly that the proposed reforms, including amalgamations, are not a cost saving exercise. Rather, they state the goal as being to enhance the 'Strategic Capacity' of local government with respect to:

- Coping with complex challenges and unpredictable change
- More robust revenue base
- Scope to undertake new functions/major projects
- Ability to employ wider range of skilled staff
- Knowledge, creativity and innovation

• Credible 'real' partner for State and Federal Government

Again there is no evidence to demonstrate that this goal of enhancing 'strategic capacity' will be achieved at all, or indeed any financial, structural or governance benefits will result – particularly for Woollahra residents and ratepayers.

My strong view on this is that what the Panel is proposing through amalgamation is a significant and unnecessary risk that may not deliver any benefits at all – either strategic or financial. What will be the ultimate cost of this risk and will it pay off?

Our community will not want to take this risk and nor should they. There is a very strong connection between paying rates in return for services but there is little or no evidence to suggest there is a connection between rates and a desire for super cities and the notion of enhanced strategic capacity

Local communities want local services and local connections – they are the things that matter most and this Council is well positioned to continue to provide both of these to our residents very well.

→ Woollahra's Capacity

Woollahra Council is well positioned financially to deliver local services —the TCorp report has confirmed this. Financially we are rated as 'Moderate' with a 'Neutral' outlook. While TCorp have said this rating is fine, we want to improve on this and our long term financial modelling is 'hard evidence' that we can do better. This is more evidence than is presented in the Panel's report about the benefits of amalgamation.

Our aim is to move from 'Moderate and Neutral' to 'Sound' or even 'Strong' and with a 'Positive' outlook and we are already in discussions with TCorp on what we need to do to achieve this. We will consider options in this regard over the coming months, and part of our strategy may be to ask our residents to pay a little more each week to have the benefit of improved services and faster infrastructure renewal. We have asked our community similar questions in the past and the answer has always been yes.

Will amalgamation deliver improved services to Woollahra residents? In the absence of a business case we don't know – but the Panel has already told us that amalgamating Woollahra is their preference. My intention is to ask our community directly what they think and I will present further information on how we might do this to Councillors shortly.

What we do know already from combined rates modelling of Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra Councils is that Woollahra residents will be paying higher rates under amalgamation with no improvement in services. I don't believe this is the best outcome for our community.

Higher rates in Woollahra to fund improved services in Waverley and Randwick - how does the Mayor of Woollahra tell our residents that's a good idea?

Where to from here:

There are two community forums I will be attending with the General Manager this week where I will have the opportunity to participate in discuss on the Panel's report and to debate the topic of amalgamation.

The first of these community forums was hosted by NewsLocal earlier this evening at Sydney Boys' High School. The Global City Community Forum provided Mayors from the City of Sydney, Leichhardt, Marrickville, Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra with the opportunity to speak for a few minutes on our response to the Independent Local Government Review Panel's idea for a global city. It was an interesting debate and whilst and I was unable to stay for all of it I think there will be a lot more community feedback to come. The outcome of this forum was agreement from the councils present to make a combined submission to the Panel. I will circulate that submission when it is available.

The second forum is a meeting with the members of the Review Panel and the Mayors, Councillors, General Managers and Senior staff of the proposed amalgamated 'global city' Councils on Tuesday.

Information gathered from these forums will also inform the structure of our submission.

Following our meeting with the Independent Local Government Review Panel tomorrow I will be working in consultation with our General Manager and Communications Manager on a suitable communication strategy to inform and engage with our local residents on their response to the global city idea.

Conclusion:

The purpose of this Mayoral Minute has been to present details of what I see as the structure of Council's submission in response to the Panel's Future Directions Paper. In particular, the Minute is to inform our community of what must be this Council's response to the proposed amalgamation of Woollahra Council into a 'global city'.

The Independent Local Government Review Panel have failed to present clear evidence of any specific benefits to be achieved from the proposed amalgamations and have provided no details of how much this widespread and drastic approach to reform of local government in NSW will cost. Quite simply, there is no business case to support the amalgamation proposal.

My position from the start of this debate on the future of local government in NSW has been to support the State Government's stated position of no forced amalgamations. Further, I have publicly stated that I support reform but I cannot support a proposal for the amalgamation of Woollahra Council in the absence of clear evidence of benefits to the community that cannot be delivered under us remaining a Council in our own right.

The Panel's latest paper presents no evidence whatsoever to change my mind. In fact, its lack of evidence should make Woollahra residents quite nervous.

Finally, I reiterate comments made in Council's submission to the Panel in March. Just as the state government recognises the need for specific specially honed planning instruments to reflect the strategic visioning for specific areas, the state government should equally recognise the need for specific intervention strategies for individual local areas and councils to ensure the future environmental, social and financial sustainability of those areas.
