2.1	Presentation of AAC meeting minutes from 13 March 2020	Minutes circulated by email, presentation continued from previous meeting as below.	
2.2	Quarterly statistics (Jan – March 2020)	<ul> <li>Colin De Costa presented Council's quarterly statistics by PowerPoint:</li> <li>11 dog attacks in total</li> <li>Vaucluse &amp; Paddington 30% each, Rose Bay 20%, Double Bay and Bellevue Hill 10% each</li> <li>Of the 11 dogs, 2 dogs could not be identified</li> <li>Action for other dogs included no action (2), warning (2), infringements (2), 'Notice of Intention to Declare Dog Menacing' (3) and Declaration of Menacing Dog (1).</li> <li>1 significant attack in Rose Bay – dog declared menacing (owner couldn't control the dog on lead)</li> <li>2 major off-lead attacks in Vaucluse Beach Paddock during off-lead time</li> </ul>	Statistics on numbers of 'off-lead' dog attacks to be circulated with minutes

2.4	Protecting animals in public domain –poisoning incidents and leashing	<ul> <li>Reports of poisoning incidents spread largely via social media. No medical confirmation</li> <li>Vet Michael Linton confirmed there were a few cases of dogs with symptoms of toxicity around in Bellevue Hill area over a short period - October 2019. However cause was not determined and no new cases identified.</li> <li>No reports of poisoning to Council by Vets</li> <li>Leashing discussed in 'new business' item – 3.1</li> </ul>	Noted
2.5	Managing dog control provisions	Discussed in 'new business' item	
2.6	Rose Bay Beach	<ul> <li>NSW Roads and Maritime provides the land, not technical part of the Woollahra Local Government Area</li> <li>One of a small number of beaches where dogs can swim off-leash</li> <li>Access to Rose Bay Beach through Tingira Reserve however dogs are required to be leashed in the reserve</li> <li>Signage improvements are being progressed</li> <li>Dogs need to be on leash getting to off-leash area</li> </ul>	Noted
2.7	Vaucluse Beach Paddock	<ul> <li>Managed by Sydney Living Museums (SLM) on behalf of NSW</li> <li>In 2004 Council resolved dogs on leash at all times and unleashed between 4.30pm – 8.30am on the 'public place' of the Beach Paddock. This was in conflict with SLM which was on leash at all times.</li> <li>Grounds of Vaucluse House – dogs on leash all the time</li> <li>After many years SLM will be adopting Council's leashing requirements for the Beach Paddock – ie. dogs on leash 8am – 4.30 pm and off-leash 4.30pm-8am</li> <li>Brief discussion held regarding to on/off- leash signage. Some members felt nominating off-leash times might be confusing for the public.         Tim Tuxford clarified that the general requirement of the Act is to have dogs on leash at all-time unless otherwise specified. Therefore, it is necessary to specify the off-leash times in compliance with the Act     </li> </ul>	Noted  Comments to be passed on Paul Fraser

3.1	COVID-19 regulatory services social distancing patrols and off leach dog observations	<ul> <li>Redeployment of Regulatory staff almost entirely to social distancing patrols at the beaches and parks</li> <li>More than 5000 social distancing patrols</li> <li>501 off leash dog warnings within period of 6 weeks</li> <li>High level of non-compliance with leashing across the whole WMC area</li> <li>Penalties not being issued at the moment</li> <li>Discussion about Robertson Park and Derby Street Reserve where dogs are prohibited, suggestions to reduce non-compliance by: <ul> <li>allowing dogs on leash to walk through the park to get to off leash areas</li> <li>applying the above to all parks where dogs are prohibited</li> </ul> </li> <li>Colin De Costa provided following comments: <ul> <li>reminder about equity of space,</li> <li>respect towards people who are scared of dogs,</li> <li>extensive numbers of off- leash area available within WMC</li> <li>controls/signage to be kept simple</li> </ul> </li> <li>Brief discussion about the need for a Watsons Bay off-leash area</li> <li>Considered Gibsons Beach Reserve - beach not suitable for off-leash due to its popularity for parents taking their children swimming and for picnics</li> <li>Emphasis on education of dog owners due to big increase in numbers of dogs/dog owners</li> <li>Broad consultation to be undertaken in the development of Council's 'Open Space Strategy'. Considered opportunity should be made available for AAC members to have input in strategy.</li> <li>Tim Tuxford to follow-up timing of Strategy with Open Space &amp; Trees staff*</li> </ul>	Current rules and signage to be reviewed and included in 'Open Space Strategy' when placed on public exhibition*
