Why compost or worm farm?

As apartment living becomes more common, finding sustainable ways to manage household waste is increasingly important. Composting and worm farming offer eco-friendly solutions that benefit both you and the planet.

Composting and worm farming helps to:

- ✓ Boost plant health. Compost and castings are full of nutrients for your garden.
- ✓ Repurpose food waste into a valuable asset! No need to buy fertiliser from the garden store which are often filled with synthetic ingredients and chemicals.
- ✓ Reduces the amount of waste sent to landfill where it decomposes and produces methane, a very potent greenhouse gas.
- ✓ Reduce the need to transport food waste in trucks to processing facilities

Tips and tricks

Order a system that is appropriate for your household size and type. If you have a balcony, an in ground worm farm may suit you best. If you have a garden with free draining soil, consider a compost bin or in ground worm (with strata approval).

Information is available. Revisit the online tutorials at any time, attend an in-person workshop, or download the 'What can go in my bin' guidelines to display as a poster.

Consistency is key!

- ✓ Turn your system regularly: using a stirrer or a garden tool, mix the contents around to ensure the system does not become anerobic – this is when it can get smelly!
- ✓ Add water when it feels dry: the consistency should be damp but not dripping (think of the moisture level like a rung-out sponge).
- ✓ Be sure to feed your system a good ratio of 'greens' (high in nitrogen) to 'browns' (high in carbon): Having a container full of carbon rich materials (such as dried leaves, cardboard, or newspaper), next to your equipment can be a good reminder.



Composting & worm farming in common areas

You can set up a worm farm on your balcony, in your garage or even indoors. Compost bins can go in private gardens with well-draining soil. If you do not have private outdoor space, you may need to use a shared common garden, which could require strata approval. This can also be a great way to connect with neighbours and reduce food waste.

Follow these simple steps to start composting or worm farming at your apartment block today.

- 1 Engage the strata committee and kindly ask for their approval.***

- 2 Order your equipment!** Waverley, Woollahra and Randwick Council provide discounts of up to 70% off for worm farming and composting equipment for eastern suburbs residents through the Compost Revolution program: compostrevolution.com.au/easternsuburbs

- 3 Invite others to join.**
Ask neighbours if they would like to participate and consider starting a 'Composting Club' to help manage the system. You can create a schedule for harvesting compost and worm castings, and set up a group chat using email, text or WhatsApp to share updates and solve any issues.



- 4 Let building staff know.** Make sure to inform building staff such as cleaners and gardeners about the systems in common areas to avoid any confusion.



- 5 Consider printing the Councils worm farming and composting guidelines** that can be useful to display as a poster in common areas as a handy reminder.



- 6 Set up your system!** Using the knowledge gained from the Compost Revolution online tutorials, pick an appropriate location for your set up and start minimising your food waste!



*this is only needed for compost bins and worm farms on common property, not balconies or private land
