How to set up a bird bath in your yard



Why put a bird bath in your yard?

- Providing water in your garden is a great way to help birds as they can use the water for drinking and bathing.
- Bird baths help you get to know your local birds and enjoy observing their behaviour.
- Birds need to bathe to keep their feathers in good condition.

What to use?

- One of the easiest and cheapest ways to get started is using large plastic saucers designed for pot plants. Look for one about 40cm across and 3-6 cm deep.
- Other simple options include hanging pots, upside down bin lids and ceramic dishes.
- You can also buy bird baths at garden shops, hardware stores and online.
- Different depths, types of baths and heights may attract different birds so don't be afraid to experiment.

Find a safe spot

- Look for a spot with dappled shade.
- To help birds protect themselves from cats and dogs elevate the bath by placing it on a stump, post or an upturned pot.
- Place the bird bath close to some shrubs and trees so birds can escape to shelter.
- Consider placing it where you can observe the birds visiting your garden.
- Keep cats indoors and if you have a dog, place the bath in an area it can't access.

Places to perch

- Put rocks or a branch in the water, especially if the bath is slippery.
- This will give the birds something to perch on and anything that falls in can climb out.

Clean and fresh

- Refresh the water regularly every day or two is good.
- Keep the bird bath clean by scrubbing regularly with a brush or scourer.
- The more use your bird bath gets the more it needs cleaning.

Be patient

- It can take time for birds to find a new water source but they will find it.
- They may take a few days to arrive or a few weeks to discover your new bird bath.
- You may not notice when birds come to visit, so keep observing and see if there are any
 other signs they've been visiting.

What else can you do to attract birds to your garden?

• One of the best ways to attract more birds to your garden is to plant local native plants that provide birds with food and shelter.
